



Lower Hill District

Before construction of the Civic Arena, the Lower Hill District was a populous center of Black culture

Civic Arena

The Lower Hill District was razed during Urban Renewal (1950s) to construct Civic Arena. Hundreds of families were displaced.

Demolition

The Civic Arena was demolished in 2010. The site is still owned by the Penguins, and used as surface parking.

Development

Though construction has not begun, the Penguins have reached a deal with the City to construct a mixed-use development.

Vision Statement

Hill District Vision Statement

The Hill District is a centrally located Pittsburgh community comprised of five different neighborhoods. The area is majority African American and most residents earn below the poverty level. Historically, the community was relatively affluent and was a well-known center of jazz music and Black culture. Prosperity began to decline in the early 1950s due to loss of industrial and manufacturing jobs and poor urban planning. Today, community-led initiatives seek to bring the Hill District back to its former glory. Much of this effort is directed by the Hill District's extremely active CDC, which largely focuses on real estate development due to the abundance of empty buildings and lots in the community.

The Hill District strives to become the neighborhood of cultural and economic status that it once was. The Hill District needs no radical changes driven by outside interests. Its existing strengths include its location in Pittsburgh, its history and culture, and its people, who have the potential to drive revitalization.

Community Engagement Strategies

Short-Term

- Activating streets
 - 3 mile p/h walk
 - Walkshops
 - Speakouts
- Engage stakeholders in churches
 - Tabling outside of churches
 - Community meetings hosted at church
 - Collective visioning boards, focus groups held at churches

Long-Term

- Activate historic sites
 - Emphasis on Black history and culture
- Advocate for and activate infrastructural improvements
 - 579 Bridge Park
 - Increase public transit / vehicular access
 - Build up border areas
- Utilize vacant lots
 - Urban agriculture
- Maintain and expand community neighborhood pride
 - "City on a Hill"

Opportunity and Key Assets

- Promote cultural tourism
- 16+ historic buildings and sites; multiple potential routes
- Include residencies of famous people from Hill District
- Very walkable, so tours will necessarily pass by local businesses and encourage economic development
- Local artisans to sell wares along the routes

Historic Walking Tours

Partners

Quantum Theater

• Lend expertise on creating entertaining events within a community

Outputs

- 15% increase in tourist traffic
- Local artisans sell 50% more wares
- \$900 thousand spent per year in the community by tourists attending a historic walking tour

Outcomes

- Significant growth in local business sales from outside patronage
- Heightened interest in Hill District as a place to invest in to start a business or buy a home, leading to an increase in population and diversity of culture and economy
- New perception of Hill District as a Pittsburgh historic treasure

Market Festival



Assets, Partners, Purpose

- Artisan market for local artists, businesses, and restaurants to come together to promote and sell their work
- Partner with #ArtsinHD, Ujaama Collective
- Work with border neighborhoods to bring outside artists as inspiration

Market Festival

Outputs

- 4 market festivals per year
- 50% increase in foot traffic
- 20% increase in new customers at local restaurants and businesses

Outcomes

- Create a regular event that brings the community together and attracts other Pittsburgh residents to support Hill District artists and businesses
- Generate interest in Hill District artists and stimulate the creative economy

Urban Gardens



The Hill District has a high rate of property vacancy. Reclamation of some vacant lots to be used as Urban Gardens will promote community engagement, provide a resource of healthy food, and potentially spur economic growth.

Urban Gardens

Partners:

- Pittsburgh Land Bank
- Hill District CDC
- Hill District residents
- Grow Pittsburgh
- Frick Conservatory

Outputs:

- 50% of vacant lots in HD repurposed as urban gardens
- 100 residents registered in Gardening training program by the end of the year
- On average 50% reduced produce costs for Hill District residents annually

Outcomes:

- Trains residents and youth to garden
- Promotes ecological education
- Generates community pride surrounding a productive and healthy landscape
- Useful greenspace is beneficial for mental health
- Improved diet due to easy access to healthy fresh produce
